

PRODJUS DATA COLLECTION INSTRUMENT 21: VILLAGE-LEVEL TIMBER MARKET ACTORS (a) & NON-ACTORS (b)

This guide is for village level actors involved and not involved in timber harvesting and trading. This could involve customary forest users, migrant workers, and so on.

Before starting the interview, be sure to:

- explain the purpose the research to the respondent
- inform the respondent that her or his participation is voluntary
- inform the respondent how to contact you if they want to change their answers
- agree on anonymity level as:
 - completely anonymous
 - name anonymous, but organisational affiliation not anonymous
 - no anonymity
- Note the interview code based on the coding schedule
- Ask how much time the respondent has
- Gain permission to proceed and note that permission has been granted.

This instrument is a guide. Each interview should touch on each section as appropriate. Questions may have the following markings:

* = Always Ask

// = related to another question. [000//] = related questions follow [//000] = dependent on previous question.

[000] = root question number for coding reference

This instrument branches into 21a (Timber and wood actors) and 21b (Non timber and wood actors). Branching sections are marked by □
